Mr Stonehouse [also spelt Stonhouse] Clerk of Bench Gladstone annoyed at direct insolence & impertinence with which Mr Mylrea acts towards him & prefers charge against him for sending message to him: “you are d.....d impertinent for sending me such meat” - Mr Mylrea thinks warranted as Mr Stonehouse “in his capacity as butcher” sent his ill wife indifferent meat - Capt O’Connell considers Mr Mylrea’s reply as aggravation of ungentlemanly rudeness of which Mr Stonehouse complains 2. 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	54/11155	1854 12 27	Hon CS	"C A F" Sydney F Garland Mylrea	1855 01 06- 1854 12 20	<p>Appears that having given rise to complaints brought against him by his own misconduct & imprudence & having been reported by Government Resident as unfit for situation, Mr Mylrea ought not be allowed to return to Port Curtis - should not be debarred from holding another office of similar description [See 55/00229 – "M F"] should opportunity offer of conferring one on him - this as well as appointment of successor to Mr Mylrea at Port Curtis to rest with Sir William Denison – Sir William should know Mr Mylrea appointed on Capt O'Connell's recommendation & selection</p> <p>At top: "Clerk to Government Resident Port Curtis" Letter in reply to CS letter 16th inst (No 54/10732) transmitting for his explanation letter from Government Resident [Margin: 24th November 1854] re certain charges of misconduct of which he is alleged to have been guilty – submits correct statement of case which he should be glad to have substantiated by a strict viva voce enquiry (were such a thing admissible) without which he, as subordinate officer, can expect to regain good opinion of Governor General or clear himself from such unexpected & unjust imputations – at moment when he might reasonably have looked for promotion from exertions used in fulfilment of duties devolving on his office, as well as otherwise in establishment of settlement of Port Curtis coupled with many hardships & privation consequent upon his being one of the first residents there <i>See Precis above –have abbreviated following paragraphs & noted key words as well:</i> Para 2: Sale of beer or spirits to one of the labourers – Bullock (known as greatest ruffian of Camp & believed labouring under insanity) – summonses informal & illegal brought to him on board ship by Constable without 24hours notice or signature of Captain O'Connell – impertinence of Mr Stonehouse Clerk of Bench in whose writing they were – proper summons brought, he did attend next morning – case dismissed, wilful & malicious charge – Bullock now prisoner for wilful & corrupt perjury in another unprecedented case, committed to Sydney from Gladstone Bench – did on 2 or 3 occasions <u>give</u> him few bottles of beer & once a bottle of rum for extra labour & for Turtle Shell Para 3: Why Government Resident did not send down copy of the whole of the evidence to illustrate true bearing of case? Para 4: Reference to 7th para of Government Residents letter: sickness in his house – asked Constable going from Camp to township to bring a small keg of brandy – gave him & labourer who helped carry it (upwards of 2 miles) part of bottle – house subsequently broken into & keg stolen – on discovering burglary reported to Government Resident as Police Magistrate – re prisoner & witnesses and himself subpoenaed to attend in Sydney Para 5: Attended Court following morning – apologised to Government Resident – Capt O'Connell appeared satisfied & <u>told him</u> at his own marquee just before he sailed: report, reprimand, details – remarks he left houseful of furniture & other property at Port Curtis, could have brought it in "<i>Tom Tough</i>" for nothing – Capt O'Connell put off settling & adjusting account of his expenditure re erection of house Para 6: Strange & serious tone of alleged complaint - confident used every exertion in his duties & carried on with credit & in proper manner at Port Curtis – regrets "troubling you" with such lengthy communication re</p>		016 - 022

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						<p>McAdamised roads [also spelt macadamised], especially across extensive plains or up course of valleys, such as occur throughout parts of New South Wales"</p> <p>"In this district there are several such along present dray track to Drayton & in my report of 23 May last, proposed a 'Tram Road' over a flat in neighbourhood of this town (Ipswich) since then I have seen several others, which are of same nature, 'black soil' nearly impassable in wet weather even for horses, with generally a scarcity of materials, fit for forming a hard road surface"</p> <p>"I would probably mark out new line of road from here to Drayton (about 65 miles) along the level flats if I was aware that Tram road was about to be, or likely to be, constructed, otherwise & with only present amount of funds for formation of road, it would be in most cases better to keep in the base of ridges, where ground is more solid than in these valleys.</p> <p>[p 300 – his p 9] "Again in making drawings for bridges, culverts etc along line of road, as also in rates of inclination, the radius of curves etc etc I would have to plan them on a <u>different</u>, & more substantial principle, were they at a future time to be used for Tram or Rail Road * [Margin: ... with steam power] the latter I don't think could be done, without much additional work, as levels of these different bridges etc would seldom come in with future levels for rails of a rail road</p> <p>"You are I suppose aware that this road differs from other leading thoroughfares such as Great Western & Southern in never having been marked out or surveyed even between towns of Brisbane & Ipswich as far as I can ascertain, no maps or records of such a road being in Survey Office (in Brisbane)</p> <p>"The present road from Brisbane to Drayton (90 miles) is only a dray track & I am engaged in examining country & making surveys to find out <u>best</u> line for future road, as one of the great roads of Colony & this is a thing which requires time and care</p> <p>[p 301 – his p 10] "The want of labour is chief obstacle I have met with in carrying out my work" – trusts above extracts of his letters attached will show he was not neglectful of the benefit of the District nor of the most advantageous expenditure of the money</p> <p>10: This road was divided into 4 Trusts, & money was only available for each particular portion of road – Government Resident did not wish any money to be expended on Brisbane portion, except at Woogaroo bridge – Police Magistrate at Ipswich wished certain works to be performed on his portion of road, which he endeavoured to do, & had to employ men for several months in neighbourhood of the town, owing to his not having any person fit to send in charge of men in the Country, nor was road marked out for them to commence upon, except near Ipswich where land was sold on either side nearly all the way, & difficulty of falling the timber & removing it without injury to fences (which were being erected every day) increased</p> <p>11: [p 302 – his p 11] For a considerable time had to superintend men <u>daily</u> – moment he could he got away to carry on surveys of Creeks for bridges & of old tracks & country adjacent previous to his deciding on the future line of road</p> <p>12: Has had greatest difficulty in getting (& have not yet succeeded) a trustworthy & competent person as "Superintendent" to look after men & works while he is out surveying - & to keep different parties supplied with tools, rations etc – quite impossible for him to do these duties & carry on</p>
