Poets win black&write! Fellowships

Two First Nations poets have won State Library of Queensland's prestigious black&write! Fellowships.

It is the first time both fellowships have been awarded to poets.

Meleika Gesa-Fatafehi from Brisbane in Queensland and Lulu Houdini from Shoalhaven, NSW will each receive \$15,000 in prize money, editorial manuscript development with State Library and a publication opportunity with Hachette Australia.

Meleika's winning entry, 'To Clear Your Throat of Fish', is a powerful political and personal poetry collection that examines themes of nature, displacement and connection to Country.

The Torres Strait Islander writer expresses their love of the islands and their family, as well as providing guidance to young Torres Strait Islander people living on the mainland.

The judges said, "With fire and ferocity, the poet beautifully encapsulates the spirit of the islands."

Gamilaroi poet Lulu Houdini's poetry collection titled 'mai-lai' is "a living archive of Gamilaroi poet Lulu Houdini's journey, forward and backward, through identity, exploration, fizz and raw energy."

According to the judges, "This is a poetry collection that is transformational and experimental in form, genre and intent."

"Houdini's writing shows great care for all things that she reflects and relates to."

The fellowship program, which has produced 17 new published books, has been introducing exciting new First Nations writers to the Australian and international literary scenes since 2011. Former winners include Sue McPherson, Jared Thomas, Nardi Simpson and Claire G. Coleman.

The black&write! Fellowships are open to all writers (published and unpublished) of Aboriginal and/or Torres Strait Islander descent currently living in Australia. The fellowships are open to adult fiction, young adult fiction, short story collection, poetry collection and children's book manuscripts.
