This guide is designed to help you discover items on the **Australian Indigenous Rights Movement since 1967** that you can access on site, from your school or home.

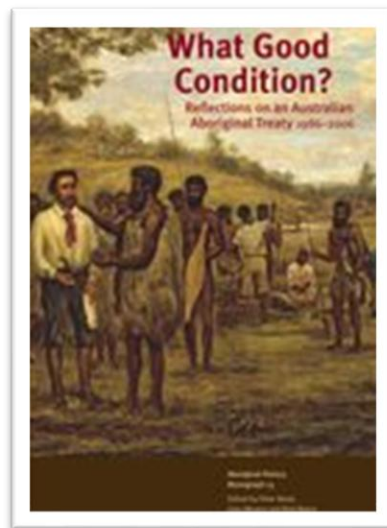
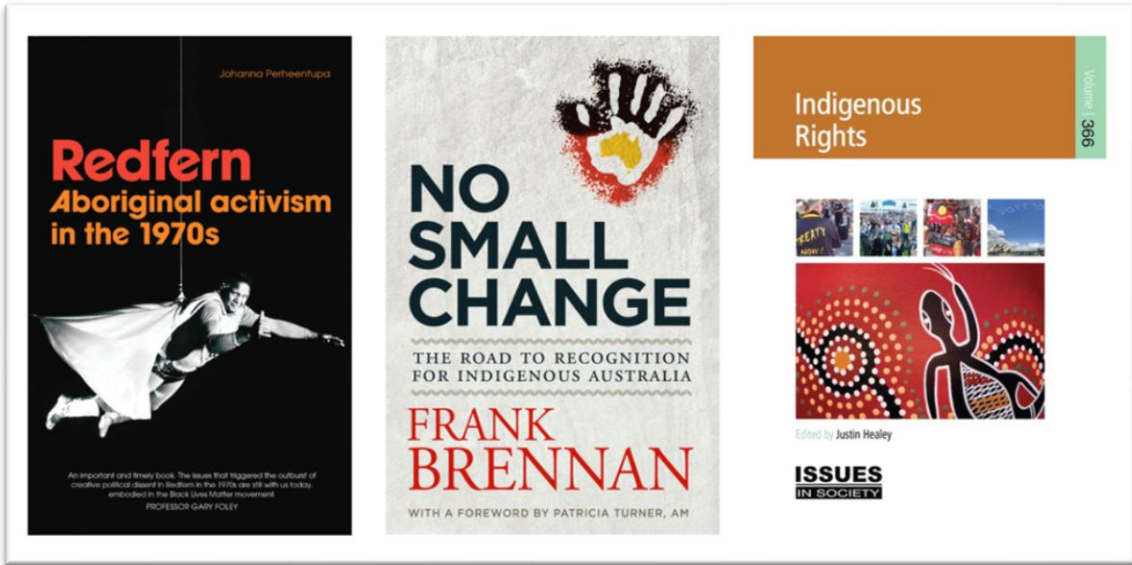

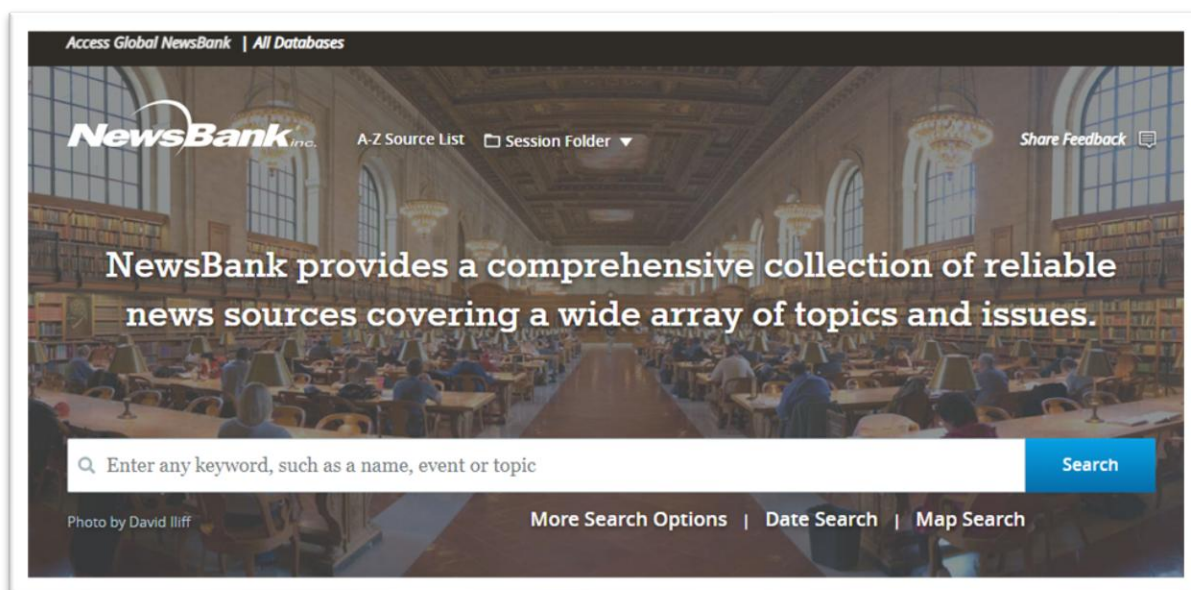


[APA-FT-Australian Public Affairs Full Text database](#) brings together over 550 journals covering Australia's political, economic, and social affairs.

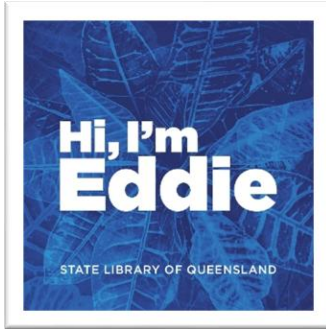
