Discovering your family history can be challenging, especially when researching First Nations ancestry. Kickstart your First Nations family history research with State Library's Who's You Mob? video guides.


The Who's Your Mob video guides were developed with the support of Telstra and the Deadly Digital Communities initiative, helping to develop digital skills through exploring family history.

- Ensured a First Nations company helped develop the resources
- Ensured language used was appropriate and culturally sensitive
- Made no assumptions about previous knowledge or understanding
- Provided links to external organisations as well as internal
- Sought feedback and consulted with First Nations colleagues and stakeholders at every stage
- Focused on online resources available to communities across the state
- Ensured material is timeless references to web addresses and content that may change in the future

- Continue promotion of the online resources via social media, stakeholders and local interest groups around the state and across Australia.
