
JAMES BIRRELL (1928 – 2019)

James Birrell was born in Victoria in 1928, graduating from Melbourne University with an architecture degree in 1951. After graduation he worked in Canberra for the Commonwealth Department of Works where his lifelong fascination with Water Burley Griffin and Marion Mahony Griffin began. Birrell became known as the man who found the long lost Canberra drawings of the Griffins, lying on the floor of an old army hut in the Canberra suburb of Riverside. He had been investigating the archives of the National Capital Authority in his spare time.

A brief stint in Darwin followed, overseeing the reconstruction of infrastructure destroyed during the Japanese bombings in the Second World War, then in 1955 at the age of 27, Birrell was appointed Brisbane City Council Architect and went on to oversee an extensive range of public building projects including libraries, car parks and even toilet blocks, over the next six years. While most buildings have been demolished in the intervening years his modernist classic, Centenary Pool, still exists at Spring Hill as does another major work, the Wickham Street carpark. Both are now heritage listed.

In 1961, Birrell was appointed the University of Queensland's Staff Architect. Here he designed arguably his best work including Union College, J.D. Story administration building and Hartley Teakle building, formerly the Agriculture and Entomology building. During this time he undertook research into the life and career of Walter Burley Griffin, releasing a pioneering biography of the architect of the national capital in 1964.

From the late 1960s Birrell went into private practice in Queensland and New Guinea, where he assisted an Australian university program to establish a university in Port Moresby. In the late 1960s he designed the campus plan for James Cook University in Townsville and several of its early buildings, including the library which is now known as the Eddie Koiki Mabo Library. Birrell also acted as a planning consultant to the Indonesian government.

In 2005 James Birrell was awarded the Australian Institute of Architects' highest honour, the Gold Medal for his "spirited and distinguished contribution to the discipline of architecture through his built work,

through his publications and through his service to the profession and the wider community". Birrell passed away in 2019.
