
JOB & FROUD

Aubrey Job was born in 1907 to a prominent Brisbane family. His mother Julie died in 1925, the same year he began work as an articled student to architect Arnold Brookes. He gained his qualification from Brisbane Central Technical College in 1929, establishing a practice with fellow architect Jim Collin, Job & Collin, Architects in Association.

Robert Froud, born in England in 1920, immigrated to Australia in 1927 settling in Adelaide before moving to Brisbane in 1934. At 16 years he began working as a junior in the office of George C. Wilson, then becoming an articled student with Mervyn Rylance. He gained his qualification at Brisbane Central Technical College in 1941 after which he enrolled in the new Diploma of Architecture course at the University of Queensland where he was taught some courses by Karl Langer. Froud was admitted to the Royal Australian Institute of Architects as an Associate member in 1946.

At the start of the Second World War Robert Froud was working with Frank Costello at the Brisbane City Council. Aubrey Job undertook his war service at the Department of Labour and National Service under Charles Fulton, where he met Robert Froud when the latter was sent to work with he and Fulton. After the War, Job, Collin and Fulton decided to work together in association and Robert Froud was enlisted as their draughtsman.

In 1954 Job and Froud established their own architectural practice A.H. Job and R.P. Froud Architects, eventually making their base at 52 High Street Toowong, where the practice stayed until merging with Thompson Adsett and Partners in 1986. Job set up an office in Noosa owing to a close association with Max Walker, the only real estate agent in the area who started sending them plenty of commissions. Froud continued to run the Toowong office. Over the 20 years from 1954-1974 they completed 318 projects, mainly one-off domestic dwellings but complemented by shopping centres, offices, school and hospital buildings, bowls clubs, civic centres and rural homesteads.

Their most well-known work Torbreck, a high-rise multi-block residential complex, was their least typical. Job supervised Torbreck's construction from 1957 to 1960 while Froud ran the drawing office, producing the detailed drawings he and Job would review. The 1960s and 1970s were particularly busy, perhaps due to the success of Torbreck, with many residential commissions in Brisbane and on the Sunshine Coast.

Job decided to retire in 1974 following a back injury sustained in a car accident in Italy. He died aged 95 years in 2002.

Froud decided to keep the business going until the work ran out and he could retire. More than ten years later, in 1986, he merged the practice with Thompson Adsett and Partner. He continued working part-time until for them until 1995, then for himself from his home office until his death in 2001.
