


The small town of Jandowae had several Greek cafes, including Peter's Cafe and Michael Morris' Canberra Cafe. As a symbol of hope and happiness, the Blue Bird was often chosen by Greek proprietors as a cafe name

Dalby had at least five Greek cafes including the Regal and Condamine Cafes and the Cafe Australia. In 1931 Londy Bros bought land in Cunningham Street to build a new shop. The Paragon Cafe was fitted by Taylor, Christie and Walker of Brisbane and took 12 months to complete. When this photograph was taken in 1934 Milton and Constantina Samios had the Paragon


Their son Jim, pictured here, was active in politics until 2003

The ABC Cafe was one of at least five Greek cafes in Warwick. Among the others were the Belle Vue and Warwick Cafes, owned by the Samios/Trifilis partnership, and the Hollywood Cafe

Mick Patrick had the Olympia Cafe in Allora at least as early as 1916. By the time this photograph was taken ca. 1924 the business had passed to Nick Andronicos

Flames could be seen from Kingaroy when the biggest fire in the history of Nanango destroyed the Commercial Hotel and eight shops in 1940. Victor Pisanos set up a makeshift business until his Cafe, the Marble Bar, was restored
