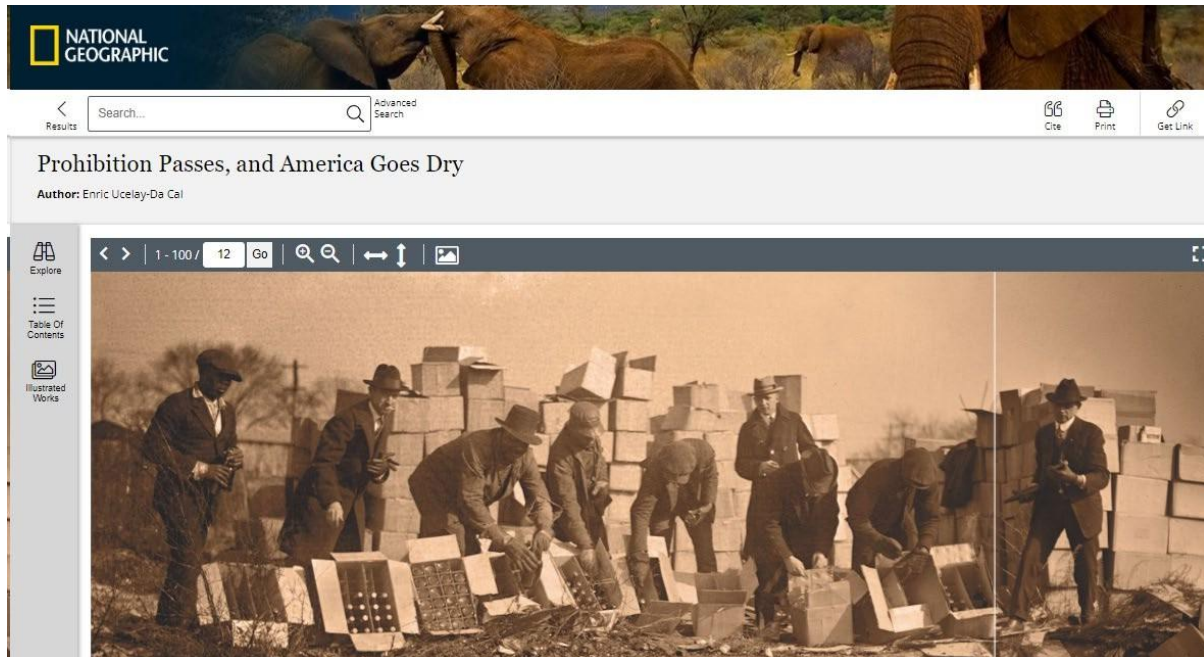

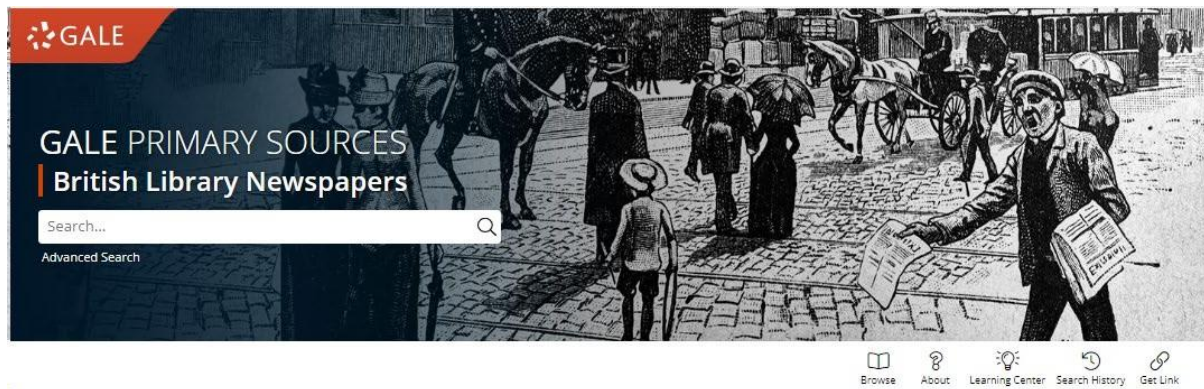


Newspapers
