In taking the step to which His Excellency the Governor of Queensland thus excepted I have the honour to point out that I did but adhere strictly to the course dictated by reason, and established by prescription, that, on matters connected with Public Accounts of Government he serves, an Auditor General shall correspond directly, and without any intervention whatever, with any Department, or any individual concerned in the keeping or preparation of those accounts. In asserting this right I need hardly disclaim all idea of asserting any to address myself otherwise than through the proper channel of the Government he serves, to any officer on subjects other than Public Accounts of this Colony  4.
