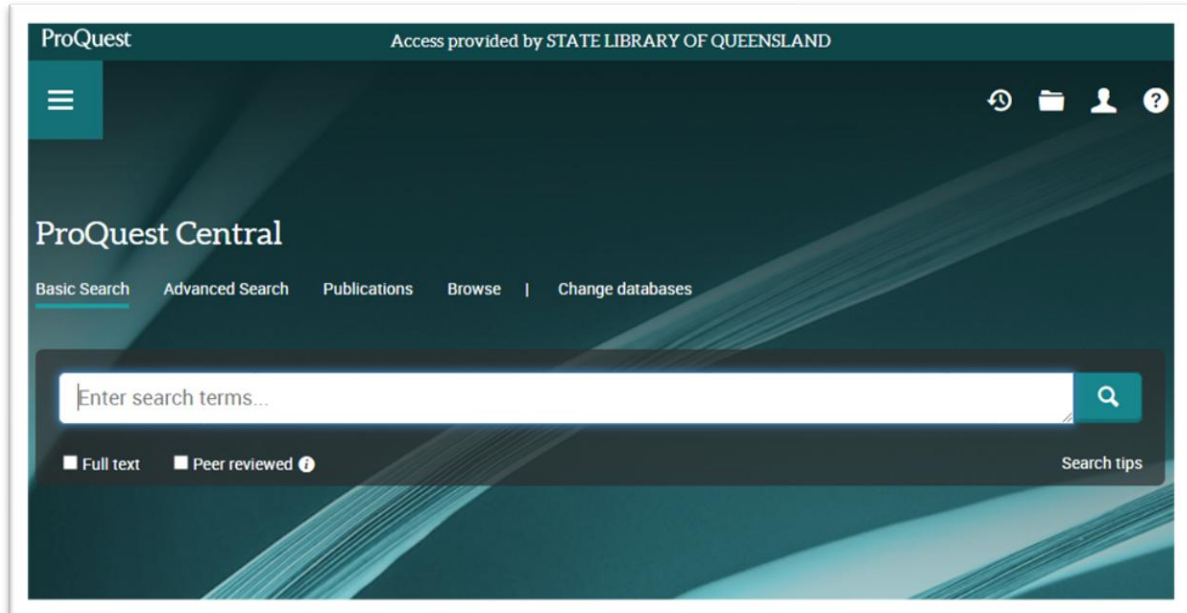
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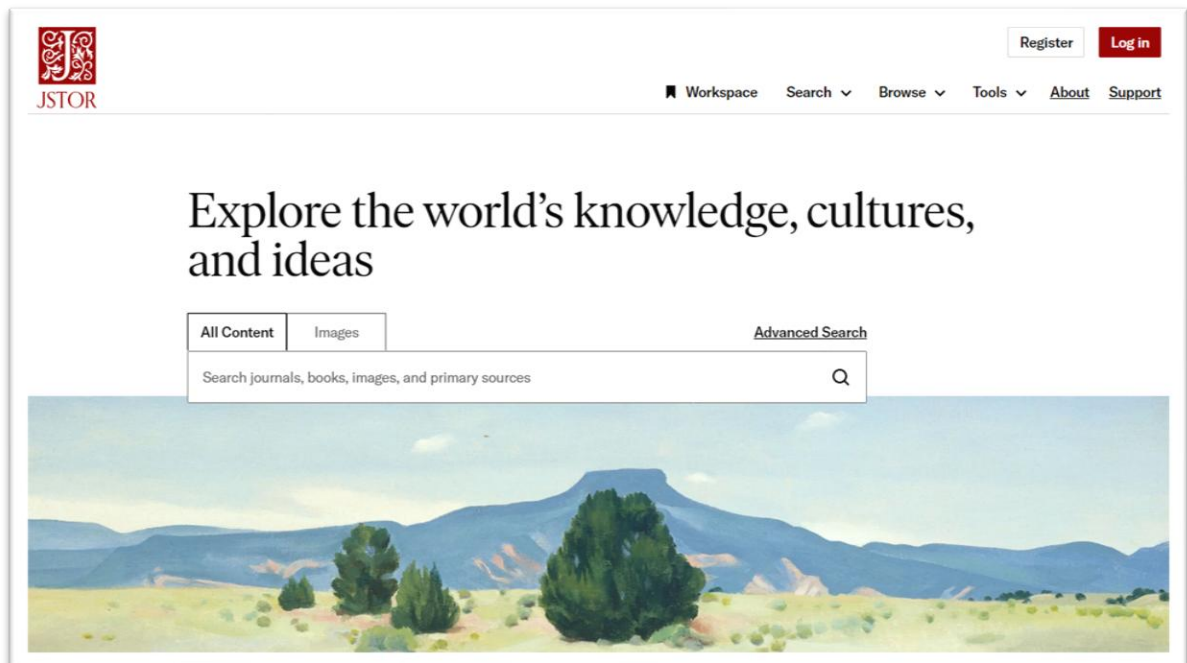

THE NEW WAR? ON, MACARTHUR WARMS U.S. Charges Chinese Aggression As Reds Pour Into Allies' Front

Foe Drives to Trap 9 U. N. Divisions; 200,000 From Manchuria in Battle

 TOKYO, Nov. 28.—Hoeders of Chinese Reds were surging tonight through a widening gap in the United States 15th Army's right flank in Northeast Korea as the failure of the Allied offensive turned into a dire threat for the entire United Nations line.
 Gen. MacArthur summoned his two chief field commanders back to Tokyo tonight for urgent conferences to discuss the new situation.
Text of MacArthur Communique Sent to U. N. Foes Entitled New War.
 After he warned that his retreating United Nations army and the non-Communist world face "an entire new war" because of the crashing Red Chinese intervention in Korea, the whole United Nations 15th Army was in retreat after being severely defeated in the first major battle since the troops of Red China had reached its gravest crisis.
 A 1st Corps spokesman said air reports indicated the Chinese were executing "along every road, every gully and every ridge line" for a distance of 25 miles north of Taichung, which lies in the center of the eastern shoulder of Allied line divisions.
 Their goal obviously was to turn the line and cut off nine Allied divisions, including the American 24th, 31st, 24th and 1st Cavalry Divisions.
 Lt. Gen. Walton H. Walker, commander of the retreating 15th Army and Maj. Gen. Edward M. Almond, commander of the 1st Corps in Northeast Korea, arrived in Tokyo by plane. They immediately began an urgent conference with Gen. MacArthur.

M'Arthur Plan Killed by Red Counterblow

 TOKYO, Nov. 28.—Gen. MacArthur's words "There is no Chinese war," spoken last Friday by the United Nations Commander in Chief, had been drowned out by the roar of a tidal-wave Chinese onslaught.
 Unless the Chinese break out and strike at the north—a wholly unlikely possibility—the general's optimistic estimate of the general's offensive cannot be fulfilled.
 On the contrary, the Chinese appear prepared to commit more and more divisions from the rapidly inexhaustible reserves.

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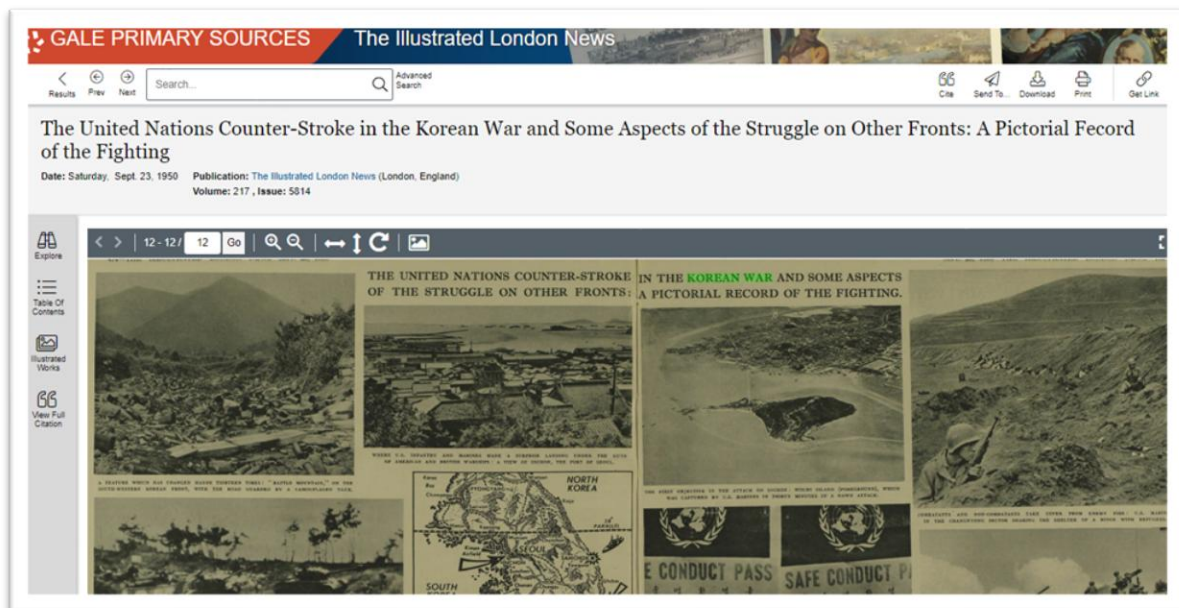
