SPEAKERS, PANELISTS AND FACILITATORS

Patricia Adjei a Wuthathi and Mabuiag Islander from Ghana is a former Head of First Nations Arts at Creative Australia. She holds a Bachelor of Arts and Law from UNSW and has studied Indigenous cultural rights internationally.

Ben Bowen, a Wiradjuri man with ties to the Gandangara, Dharrawal, and Yuin Nations, is CEO of the Indigenous Literacy Foundation. Ben brings extensive experience in education, health, and economic development from his work with Indigenous communities and governments.

Cheryl Buchanan is a Kooma (Gwama) woman from Cunnamulla, Queensland, acclaimed playwright, and is the first Aboriginal woman publisher in Australia. Cheryl published Lionel Fogarty's *Kargun* in 1980 and founded Murrie Coo-ee publishing firm.

Robert Congoo, known traditionally as Girudhala Japanangka Bannari with the Girudhala (Eagle) totem, is Director of Yooribaya Cultural Experiences in Ngaro Country in the Whitsundays region.

Aunty Jennifer Creek is a Southern Kaantju elder of Far North Queensland. Born in Coen, Cape York, Aunty Jen is dedicated to revitalising the Kaantju language and has developed a Kaantju dictionary.

Desmond Crump of the Gamilaroi Nation in South-West Queensland is dedicated to reviving languages through education. He supports school language programs and is currently an Industry Fellow at the University of Queensland. He also serves on the Office of the Arts National Directions Group and the AIATSIS Languages Advisory Committee. **Dr Debra Dank** is a Gudanji and Wakaja woman from the Barkly Tablelands and is an accomplished author and scholar. Her debut book, *We Come with This Place*, is based on her PhD research on polyphony in Aboriginal narratives.

Shaun Davies is a Yugambeh man and passionate advocate for ensuring that Yugambeh language and culture are preserved. Shaun's work is led by Yugambeh people and ways of doing things.

Tylissa Elisara is a children's social worker from the Narungga, Kaurna, and Adnyamathanha people of South Australia, raised on Mamu Country in Innisfail, Queensland. *Wurrtoo* is her first novel.

Lucretia Huen (nee Creek) is a Southern Kaantju and Ayapathu woman from Coen, Cape York. Lucretia is the General Manager at Coen Regional Aboriginal Corporation in Cape York.

Cheryl Leavy is a Kooma and Nguri writer whose poem *Ngali - We two* won the 2022 Oodgeroo Noonuccal Poetry Prize. Cheryl's first children's book, *Yanga Mother*, written in both Kooma and English was published by UQP in 2024. Passionate about language revitalisation, Cheryl often writes in her Kooma language.

John Morseau is a Senior Project Officer for the Torres Strait Regional Authority's Culture, Art and Heritage Program. A Torres Strait Islander with family connections to Badu, Erub, Masig, Mabuyag and Mer Islands.

Rory O'Connor is a descendant of Jacky-Jacky (c. 1815–1900), King of Logan-Pimpama and Jenny Graham (c. 1859–1943). As Director of SEQ Indigenous Language Centre and formerly CEO of Yugambeh Museum, Rory is the driving force behind many positive initiatives keeping Aboriginal heritage alive in the South East region.

Bebe Oliver a Bardi Jawi descendant from the Kimberley and award-winning writer based in Naarm (Melbourne), has held senior roles in major organisations. He has championed Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander creatives and promoted Traditional Culture. His writing, poetry, illustration, and facilitation delve into identity, love, loss, and connection to Country.

Tania Schafer (née Bostock)

is a Mununjali and Bundjalung woman who has worked at the State Library of Queensland since 1992. She specialises in family history, languages, and community connections, focusing on researching, preserving, and sharing First Nations heritage.

Melanie Sorenson is an experienced conservator with a background in government institutions, as well as freelance work. Melanie now works for State Library of Queensland and is passionate about caring for First Nations objects and their connections to memory and storylines.

Nova Watson is a Collection Management Archivist at Queensland State Archives. She specialises in enhancing descriptions of records related to Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people and supports the Truth Telling and Healing Inquiry.
